### Winter Mail Delivery

Remember to keep the area around your mailbox or cluster unit free of vehicles and snow.

Santaquin City has more than 77 miles of road. Main Street and SR 198 are plowed by UDOT. The City's three large snow plows are used in the following priority: First, the hillsides and main roads are cleared. After that, arterials (primary access roads) are plowed. Side streets and subdivisions are next, with dead ends and cul-de-sacs being plowed last. For small areas such as cul-de-sacs, where there is not enough room to turn one of the larger plows around, the City's smaller plow is brought in.

Public Works spends hours plowing, often through the night. Please be patient as they work their way around town. Residents are responsible to clear their own driveways, sidewalks and access areas in front of their homes. Please use caution around the snow plows.





### In My Own Words: Finding More Love and Gratitude in Our Hearts



I love a good baseball game! Hot dogs, Cracker Jack, and the smack of the bat as it hits the ball, all bring back great childhood memories. The Houston Astros and Philadelphia Phillies are playing in the World Series as I am writing this. I recently read an experience about one of the all-time baseball greats. His name was Jackie Robinson. He played for the Dodgers, before the team moved to Los Angeles.

"In 1947, Jackie Robinson was the first African American baseball player to play in the Major Leagues with the Brooklyn Dodgers. He faced a lot of opposition from his coaches, teammates, other players, and the public, but

opposition from his coaches, teammates, other players, and the public, but he was chosen because he had the intelligence to understand that he would have to show selfcontrol. Philadelphia Phillies manager Ben Chapman and his squad faced the Dodgers in just the fifth game of the season. During the three-game series from April 22 to April 24, the native Alabaman was reported as having told his players to "ride Robinson unmercifully" from the bench. According to Robinson after the season, the news report was not an exaggeration. "Hey, you black [expletive]" and "Why don't you go back where you came from?" are two taunts Robinson recalled hearing players yell during his first at-bat. As much as Robinson wanted to "take a sock at one of them," he gritted his teeth and used the epitaphs as motivation to hit a single. This was one of the defining moments of Robinson's entire baseball career, which lasted until 1956, because he showed his inner strength by holding back, retaliating with his bat instead of his fists."

Jackie Robinson set a strong example of how to stand up against hate and bigotry. He used the opportunity given to him to be a leader and create a lasting legacy. He never forgot from where he came or how many young people were watching him. He did not let anyone else control his thoughts, beliefs, feelings, or actions.

As we prepare for Christmas, I hope that each of us will look into our own heart and clean out whatever anger, hatred, or contempt we may be holding. The potential damage of those types of feelings can poison our heart more than anyone else's. I encourage each to stand up to those who are unkind by being kind. When we take the time to do our own housecleaning, in our own heart, there can be room for more gratitude and love to grow.
