Snow Plow Information

Santaquin City has more than 77 miles of road. Main Street and SR 198 are plowed by UDOT. The City's three large snow plows are used in the following priority: First, the hillsides and main roads are cleared. After that, arterials (primary access roads) are plowed. Side streets and subdivisions are next, with dead ends and cul-de-sacs being plowed last. For small areas such as cul-de-sacs, where there is not enough room to turn one of the larger plows around, the City's smaller plow is brought in.

Public Works spends hours plowing, often through the night. Please be patient as they work their way around town. Residents are responsible to clear their own driveways, sidewalks and access areas in front of their homes. Please use caution around the snow plows.


This will be a wonderful evening for families as we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

Photo Contest Winner



In My Own Words | December Newsletter



As my time serving Santaquin City as a City Council Member draws to a close, I have pondered on what I want to share in this, my last submission to the newsletter. Viktor Frankl (1905-1997) was an Austrian Psychiatrist and Holocaust survivor. In his book Man's Search for Meaning (2006) about his experiences in a Nazi concentration camp, Dr. Frankl states that "Between every stimulus and response, there is a space. In that space is our power to choose our response. In our response lies our growth and our freedom." Serving on the City Council

has provided a tremendous opportunity for me to see the truth of those words! The way that others treat us, or the things that others say (or write) about us, are not a reflection of us. How we choose to respond is a reflection of ourselves.

How others treat us reflects the person giving the treatment. There is something in their own heart that results in that sort of behavior. There is anger and bitterness that existed long before you, or I, came into the picture. That anger and bitterness will remain long after you and I are out of the picture, unless the giver chooses to do what it takes to heal their heart. The first thing that I do to help my heart heal is to forgive. There is so much power in making that choice! We can remain free from bitterness, hatred, and anger because of that **one** choice.

I believe that is what Viktor Frankl is teaching in his statement. We get to choose! We get to choose the condition of our own heart at any given moment in time. We get to choose how, or whether, to respond to a comment on social media, or to an email. We get to choose how we respond to those who are unkind. We choose how we respond to those who do show kindness. It is unwise to surrender the power of that choice to anyone else. When an error is made in our response, it is important to reflect on that and to be willing to improve; to change. None of us is perfect. That's just the way it is.

Especially at this Holiday season, I encourage each of us to reflect on the condition of our own heart and take inventory of our choices. Those who will one day lead this nation, state, and city are watching. They are listening and reading. The choices we make today influence the world in which they live.

In closing, I want to thank our amazing employees for their dedicated service. It has been a joy working with you. I want to thank the members of the Youth City Council for their many hours of service to the community and their desire to learn. You will always have a piece of my heart. I want to thank those who have shown kindness to me and to my family. It has not gone unnoticed. I want to thank my family for supporting me in more ways than I can keep track of. It is not just the elected person who makes sacrifices. I am ready to return my focus to my family and my professional work and will look back with fondness on my time as a Council Member. After all, some of the most lasting lessons seem uphill both ways.

Mayor's Message | December Newsletter



Greetings to all, and my hopes that your Thanksgiving celebrations went very well.

Christmas will soon be here and with it, thoughts of all that surrounds this wonderful season fill our heads. We older folks think of the excitement we had in our youth, waiting for the magic of Christmas. I hope as you plan and work toward Christmas of 2023 that it will be filled with many good memories.

As 2023 is wrapping up, I want to report that good things are happening in the City. New businesses and investors are working to make Santaquin a better place. We have even moved forward this past year with the development of a new industrial park, called Santaquin Peaks. As of November, we will have developed and partnered with businesses to build the park (which is still under construction), place the needed infrastructure, and we've not had to raise taxes or take on any debt to accomplish this. We have been successful, while creating a development that will bring jobs, taxes, and commercial growth to our city. This effort has been a lot of work, but is also a real investment in our future. Thanks to our council and staff for working through this.

In the second week of November, bids were opened to award the last piece to the Central Utah Project (CUP) water pipeline to Santaquin. The Santaquin Reach will be under construction this winter. It will take a couple years to finish and then it will be ready to deliver water for our citizens. With this, we are working to ensure that we as a city are ready for the costs. Preparations for this pipeline have been underway for years. The previous City administration arranged for a financial set-aside to cover the costs for the water. The first few years are already well planned out as we near the delivery timeframe. Everything that could be done to reduce the cost, yet plan for construction and delivery is complete, right down to cleaning out the water pipe when needed. Please prepare for some construction delays and traffic to reroute at times in the coming months. The project starts near Spring Lake, goes west, under I-15, then mostly follows the railroad tracks to the northwest side of the reservoir that is west of the City.

Some have felt the CUP would never arrive, but it is here. It will be here to stay. Let's make the most of it and continue our wise use of this precious resource. We continue to work on water projects and will ensure that we, as city stewards, do our utmost to make this resource work for years to come. I have heard that this pipeline was coming since 1958. This has been a lifelong project for us to now see coming to fruition.

With the reconstruction planned for Main Street in the later parts of the winter, please know that we are working to make this city a better place to live, shop, recreate, and to make it better for our future generations. Thank you for your part in it all, We ask for your patience as slowdowns will certainly come with these projects. We will most certainly see more projects in the future and will work to make the construction as bearable as possible.

One last thing, I wish you all a Happy New Year! May 2024 bring the very best to each of you and your families.
