




Spring Open Burn

Mayor's Newsletter | May 2023



Given the unprecedented snow this past winter, we anticipate more water flowing from the mountain snowpack and an increased risk for flooding. We have worked diligently to put in place the appropriate mitigation measures that protect our community. I would like to thank everyone who has volunteered with these efforts. With all of this water, I do not wish to open the floodgates further but I feel a deep responsibility to bring an important topic to your attention.

As you may know, we have not raised property taxes since 2013. During that same time, we have more than doubled in population while our property tax

rate has actually decreased and historically high inflation has diminished our city budget. For the past eighteen months, we have thoroughly reviewed the budget to reduce spending and increase revenues wherever possible.

To cut spending, we have reduced staffing levels, halted building repairs and delayed equipment purchases. To increase revenues, we have actively engaged federal and state partners, and pursued grants and other funding opportunities. In addition, we have withdrawn funds from our rainy day fund to temporarily offset budget deficits. Despite these diligent efforts, we have an impending budget shortfall.

Folks, we are at a tipping point. We must consider raising property taxes.

I am a fiscal conservative who does not like the prospect of raising taxes. I see it as my solemn responsibility to bring this issue to your attention. Let me explain exactly why we need this proposed property tax increase and what it would mean for you.

The proposed increase would cost an average household about \$10 a month and would add about \$595,000 to the city budget annually. We would use the money to purchase needed police vehicles and maintain the recent compensation increases for firefighters and police officers. These modest public safety wage increases have been vital to supporting competitive, fair market wages for the first responders who serve our community and save lives. Competitive compensation allows us to attract and retain qualified public safety officers who provide vital emergency services to you when you need them most.

We strive to be responsible stewards of trusted taxpayer dollars and conduct ourselves with full integrity and transparency at all times. In the coming months, you are going to see more information about the proposed increase and I encourage you to get involved- read the materials, ask us questions, and attend upcoming public meetings.
