Thank you, Chad, for all the years of dedicated volunteer service you have given our community. You are appreciated and loved.

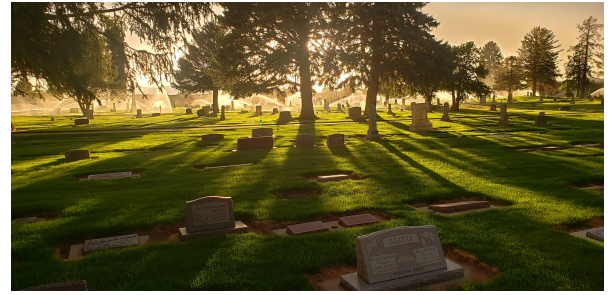
## In My Own Words | Looking Forward With Hope

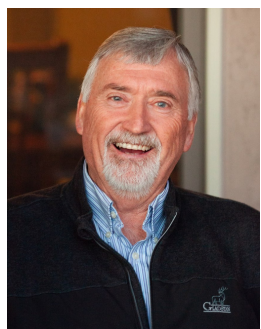

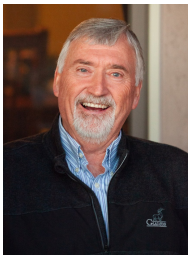
