
#### Winter Parking:

#### Lamb of God - A Sacred Work



#### Mayor's Message | March Newsletter



Greetings to all in Santaquin. I presume we are all ready for spring now that March is officially upon us.

This month's newsletter is one of updating you all on our progress. We held an open house at the end of January that invited citizens to provide input. That open house had to do with the Environmental Study to gather the needed data required to move along a timeline to replace the Interchange of I-15 and Main Street.

The consulting engineers and UDOT staff discussed possible solutions. They also asked those in attendance for any ideas they had for access to homes and businesses and

for the free flow of traffic. The UDOT staff and engineering consultants at the open house gathered the data and will include it in their analysis going forward.

In September of 2023, Santaquin City opened bids for our Main Street reconstruction project . We only received one bid submittal that was well above our available funding. This required us to rebid because of the much higher bidding costs that are a result of the COVID 19 pandemic and the resulting inflation.

The final bids from the rebid came back in December but still left us short several million dollars. With extensive Mayor, staff, and Council effort we met with the UDOT Region 3 Director and engineers as well as the Mountainland Association of Government (MAG) to secure the needed additional funding.

In the first weeks of February, we were able to make presentations to those at MAG as well as the Utah Transportation Commission. As a result of those presentations, we were able to obtain the needed additional funds to proceed with both of the Phase Four and Phase Five projects. This will help us to finish Main Street from 300 East to about 600 West with two travel lanes in each direction and a center left turning lane. This construction project will create some challenges with driving on Main Street over the next two years. However, appropriate access will still be provided for businesses and residents. We will work with the contractor to minimize any inconvenience. Please be aware that, as with all construction projects, there are still times when new challenges may arise and we will work closely to reduce impacts to the best of our ability.

With the needed capacity for traffic flow on Main Street, we will all need patience to get through this construction. By the year's end we are hoping to have half of the project complete with a new stop light at Center Street and Main Street.

I ask you all to find ways to adjust your travel, use a different interchange, or expect a delay or two. With growth comes changes that challenge us to find ways to make life better.

This project began a few years ago and now we get the chance to see a change on our Main Street. This will lead us to the next project, which is the interchange reconstruction. However, there are studies, planning, engineering, and funding to work on in order to resolve this bottleneck. We are doing the best that we can to make this as painless as possible. Please help us through these next couple of years to make this Main Street reconstruction project a success.
