Important Pressurized Irrigation Information

Public Works will turn on the pressurized irrigation **around April 15th**. It can be up to two weeks before or after depending on weather. It takes two to three days to fully charge the system. Please check your valves and make sure your system is ready to avoid flooding from possible broken pipes or taps that are turned on.



Santaquin City Spring Clean Up

City-wide Spring Clean Up will be held **Saturday, April 24th through Saturday, May 1st**. **ALL** dumpsters will be at the old Santaquin City landfill located at 1100 W 200 N (Lark Lane). **During the clean up, it will be open from 10am to 6pm daily, Monday – Friday and 9am to 5pm on Saturdays**. Please separate green waste from metals. You can take furniture, televisions, carpet, mattresses and large boxes. **Do NOT** take paint or liquids, toxic materials/chemicals, household garbage, freezers, refrigerators or tires.

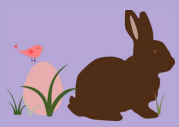

Santaquin City Annual Drinking Water Quality Report - 2020

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of the water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water comes from four springs and two wells that all provide groundwater.

The Drinking Water Source Protection Plan for Santaquin City is available for your review. It contains information about source protection zones, potential contamination sources and management strategies to protect our drinking water. Potential contamination sources common in our protection areas are residential wastewater disposal systems, roads, mining, and agricultural operations. Our sources have a low susceptibility to potential contamination. We have also developed management strategies to further protect our sources from contamination. Please contact us if you have questions or concerns about our source protection plan.
