Snow Plow Information

Santaquin City has more than 65 miles of road. Main Street and SR 198 are plowed by UDOT. The City's three large snow plows are used in the following priority: First, the hillsides and main roads are cleared. After that, arterials (primary access roads) are plowed. Side streets and subdivisions are next, with dead ends and cul-de-sacs being plowed last. For small areas such as cul-de-sacs, where there is not enough room to turn one of the larger plows around, the City's smaller plow is brought in.

Public Works spends hours plowing and often through the night. Please be patient as they work their way around town. Residents are responsible to clear their own driveways, sidewalks and access areas in front of their homes. Please use caution around the snow plows.

All Together Now

Do you know the story of swimmy?

Perhaps like me, you read the 1963 book by Leo Lionni over and over again as a young child. Or, like me, you read it night after night to your own children.

Here's how it goes.

Swimmy is a little fish who lives happily in the ocean with his many brothers and sisters. One day, a much larger fish comes darting through the waves and, in one gulp, swallows every fish in the school except swimmy himself. Swimmy escapes to wander the seas and, though at first scared and lonely, eventually comes upon another school of fish just like his own family.

"Let's go and swim and play and see things!" Swimmy says happily.

But the fish are hiding in the dark shade of rocks and weeds. If they come out, they explain, a big fish will eat them all. Swimmy thinks for a long time. Suddenly, he says, "We are going to swim all together like the biggest fish in the sea!" And he shows them how, if they swim close together, just so, they will look like one giant fish.

Swimmy and the triumphs of these little fish leapt to mind when I read one of the articles Stanford psychologist Al Bandura selected, among the hundreds he'd written, to mail to me months before he died. The choice was timely because Al was working on a book on collective efficacy, a groups belief in their combined power to achieve shared goals. The choice was also timely because, as he pointed out in what would be our last phone conversation, a single person alone can't solve challenges like climate change, social inequality, or the pandemic.

Just as self-efficacy emboldens the individual to chase their dreams, collective efficacy motivates the group to set shared goals, coordinate their actions, and overcome obstacles. "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world," said anthropologist Margaret Mead. "Indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

Don't think that solving problems depends on either the individual or social structures. "Personal agency and social structure," Bandura wrote, "operate interdependently." It's not either/or, it's both/and. Do share the story of swimmy with a young person in your life. And remember the legacy of Al Bandura when you read the very last line:

And so they swam in the cool morning water and in the midday sun and chased the big fish away.



Dear Santaquin Residents and Friends,

The election is over, and we have newly elected officials. They will be sworn in on January 3rd at noon, and will from that point on, carry the weight of the city's decision-making on their shoulders. It has been a pleasure for me to get to know each of the candidates that ran for office, and I look forward to seeing how the new officials will tackle challenges as they serve. I encourage you to support your new officials, especially your new mayor, Dan Olson. He is a great man, and he genuinely cares about Santaquin City and the wonderful people who reside here. The new officials will be experiencing a very steep learning curve immediately upon taking office, and they will need your help to make their time in office a success. Be quick to help and slow to judge. In time, each will learn what is required to truly be a benefit to our great city.

With winter coming on, I would like to encourage each resident to look out for your neighbors. There may be times when driveways and sidewalks could be cleared of snow, and there may be times when a meal could be taken in or an errand run. We are still in the throngs of a worldwide pandemic, and the ramifications are still touching families in our community whether it is financial or health wise. Please pay attention to the people around you and reach out to help when you see the need. Also, if you know of someone who has lost a job because of the pandemic, please be on the lookout for new opportunities that might fit their skill set. It is often those who you know that can help those looking for a new career.

I would also like to make our residents aware of a new ordinance which was passed during a recent city council meeting. (Ordinance 11-01-2021 - OHV Regulations) Because we have seen an increase in the number of children operating OHV's on our city streets and because there have been some serious accidents involving children who were not supervised by parents while operating said OHV's, a new law has been passed that requires OHV operators (on our city streets) obtain a Utah state driver license, with an exception for agricultural/husbandry. This means drivers must be at least 16 years old to qualify for the license after obtaining the required hours of practice, education, and testing. Because OHV's have the capability of running anywhere from 40 to 85 mph maximum, and due to their weight, these OHV's pose a risk to their operators, passengers, as well as to pedestrians and the driving public. Drivers need to have the intellect, motor skills, training (both on OHV operation as well as understanding of vehicular traffic laws), and emotional stability to operate one. I recognize this change will feel restrictive to some, but to others it will be a welcomed relief because of the number of unsupervised children drivers on our streets. As mayor, I have spent many nights worrying about the children of our community and have prayed that not one of them lose their lives while speeding up and down our streets on motor vehicles. Safety is not only my primary duty as outlined by law, but it is also my highest personal priority. I feel this new law will enhance safety and protect our children in the long run.

Lastly, our "Santa" quin's Holly Days festival is finally just a few days away. I would really like this new event to become something special, not only for our residents but for those in the surrounding communities. Invite your friends, family, and neighbors to the events taking place on December 10th and 11th. Details are found in this newsletter and on our city website. Come enjoy visiting with Santa and an exciting fireworks show.

With Thanksgiving behind us and Christmas rushing in, I encourage you to focus in on the Spirit of the Season. We have much to be grateful for and we have much that can

be done to support one another. Look for opportunities to share joy and blessings. Look for ways to build one another up and offer kindness in word and deed. Our world has become much too cynical with social media being the means to hide behind unkind words. Be the one who lifts others up; be the one who brings about a change of positivity, brotherhood, and sisterhood to members of our community.
